CHAIRMAN'S REPORT

CHAIRMAN'S REPORT

Dear shareholders

On behalf of the Board of Directors I am pleased to present the Talga Gold Limited Annual Report for the financial year ended 30 June 2011.

Talga was created as a listed vehicle to raise investor capital to fund an energetic gold exploration programme. Administration costs are kept low to ensure a high proportion of funds are spent in the field. Investors are leveraged to gain maximum advantage from exploration success through 100% ownership of key projects and a tight capital structure (46.35 million shares and 1.1 million unlisted options at 30 June 2011).

The Company has four key projects in its exploration portfolio. The Talga Talga, Warrawoona and Mosquito Creek projects were all acquired from prospectors in the historic East Pilbara gold region. With the gold price at near record highs the Board believes that there is significant scope in these gold exploration tenements, most of which have been in private hands for many years. The Board sees a fundamental logic in consolidating and exploring these projects with the objective of ultimately becoming a gold producer within the Pilbara region and beyond.

The company's Bullfinch project in the Yilgarn region has had a lower profile during the year. However valuable progress has been achieved gaining key statutory permits and landholder access, geological reconnaissance and the identification of new gold targets. The company also pegged a significant extension of prospective ground at Bullfinch during the year. The Board expects a higher profile for the Bullfinch project in the coming year as exploration activity there intensifies.

Talga was admitted to the Australian Securities Exchange on 7 July 2010 (ASX code: TLG). Significant achievements over the financial year include:

- Capital raising – including an initial public offering that raised \$5 million at \$0.20 per share, followed by a private placement in May 2011 that raised a further \$2.1 million at \$0.35 per share.
- Exploration – from listing until the time of writing the company concluded two RC and one diamond drilling programme at Talga Talga, plus two RC programmes at Warrawoona (the first being scout holes at Cutty Sark and the second being the maiden programme at Kiwi Ridge mentioned above). This is in addition to various geochemical sampling, prospecting and other field activities across the Company's four projects.
- Land consolidation – including acquisition of small additional tenements adjacent to the Talga Talga project, ground at Mount Edgar (near Marble Bar), prospects in Nullagine and an additional 930km² at Bullfinch.
- Office establishment – key staff were employed and an office established at the company's West Perth premises.

I wish to acknowledge the our Managing Director Mark Thompson whose vision, energy and experience has created a company with a dedicated team, a tight capital structure and the funds required to advance the exploration of Talga's projects. I also acknowledge the efforts of Piers Lewis, who brings significant financial and external reporting expertise to his joint role as non-executive director and company secretary.

In a tight labour market the company has been able to secure the services of a talented and dedicated team of office and field staff. The Board acknowledges the efforts of all staff, particularly the exploration team who spent considerable periods in the field during the year. The Board has sought to link in key staff to the wealth created by their efforts by introducing an employee share option plan during the year.

Looking ahead

It is only just over a year since Talga Gold was listed. However a significant progress has been achieved. Those following the company will have noticed the stream of releases on the company's exploration activity. The Board is particularly proud that this has been coupled with a modest cash burn rate.

CHAIRMAN'S REPORT

Moving forward the Board believes that the first year of operations leaves the Company well placed to pursue a strong exploration programme in the year ahead. This will certainly include further activity on the projects in both the Pilbara region and Bullfinch. With our tight capital structure and modest cash burn rate the objective is to ensure that shareholders gain maximum leverage from exploration success.

BOARD OF DIRECTORS

The names and details of the Talga Gold Ltd ("Company") directors in office during the financial year and until the date of this report are as follows.

Sean Neary (Non-Executive Chairman)

Mr Neary is a Certified Practicing Accountant with more than 20 years experience in finance and commercial advisory roles. His experience includes more than ten years in audit and tax consulting with 'Big Four' and second tier accounting practices in Australia, and commercial experience including six years in a finance role with US based chemical giant, Dow Corning. In addition to his exceptional leadership qualities, Mr Neary brings to the Talga Gold board a wealth of financial industry and corporate strategy experience that will ensure the company's sustainable growth towards gold production.

Mark Thompson (Managing Director)

Mr Thompson has more than 20 years industry experience in gold exploration and mining management, working extensively on major resource projects throughout Australia, Africa and South America. In addition to this practical experience, his roles as a Manager and Director of several private geological consultancies have developed his already extensive skills in all aspects of mineral exploration and project development.

Mr Thompson founded and served on the Board of ASX listed Catalyst Metals Ltd and is a member of the Australian Institute of Geoscientists and the Society of Economic Geologists.

Piers Lewis (Non-Executive Director & Company Secretary)

Mr Lewis has more than 13 years global corporate experience and is currently Company Secretary for several ASX listed companies. In 2001 Mr Lewis qualified as a Chartered Accountant with Deloitte (Perth), and brings to the Talga Gold Board extensive and diverse financial and corporate experience from previous senior management roles with Credit Suisse (London), Mizuho International and NAB Capital.

CORPORATE STRUCTURE

Talga Gold Ltd is a company limited by shares that is incorporated and domiciled in Australia. Talga Gold Ltd has a 100% interest in a dormant company in which certain tenements are registered.

DIRECTOR'S REPORT

NATURE OF OPERATIONS AND PRINCIPAL ACTIVITIES

The principal activity of the Company during the year was gold and mineral exploration on the Company's 100% owned projects in Western Australia. Exploration was predominantly field based utilising geochemical sampling and drilling. In addition, the company acquired new gold prospects in Australia and reviewed other growth opportunities.

REVIEW OF OPERATIONS

Talga Gold Limited (Talga, the Company) was admitted to the Australian Securities Exchange (ASX) on 7 July 2010 under the trading symbol TLG and began trading on the ASX on 9 July 2010.

Corporate

The initial public offering (IPO) raised \$5 million in share capital at \$0.20 per share. In May 2011 the company raised an additional \$2.1 million via a private placement at \$0.35 per share. As at 30 June 2011 the Company had 46.35 million shares and 1.1 million unlisted options on issue. As at 30 June 2011 the Company had \$4.5 million in cash at bank. The loss for the year was \$1.5 million, being the result of exploration expenditure and costs incurred in ordinary administrative and regulatory activities.

Exploration

Talga has acquired a range of gold exploration interests in Western Australia. The Talga Talga, Warrawoona and Mosquito Creek projects are in the Pilbara region, near the towns of Marble Bar and Nullagine. The Bullfinch project is in the Yilgarn region, near the town of Southern Cross.

Talga Talga (TLG 100%)

The Company's most significant exploration during the year focused on the Talga Talga project (150km southeast of Port Hedland). This included one Reverse Circulation (RC) and one diamond drilling programme, plus a second RC campaign after year end (with the results of this latter campaign pending at the time of writing). A 1,408 sample soil geochemical survey and other field activities were also undertaken. Overall the project covers more than 10km² of prospective gold targets and historic workings with high grade recorded gold production. The drilling during the year focused on the McPhees prospect which is approximately 650m strike and was drilled to a maximum down-dip depth of 250m. This was the first time the target was ever drilled for gold and the highlights that included 1m @ 73.5 g/t Au and 1m @ 66.9 g/t Au (see ASX releases 9 and 25 November 2010) were most encouraging. Additional reconnaissance holes were also completed 1,400m northeast along strike in the Quartzite prospect area. In July 2011 the Company drilled a further 35 RC holes at Talga Talga with the objective of stepping out the McPhees prospect.

All of the above activity has been undertaken within the Company's granted mining lease at which covers approximately one third of the Talga Talga project. Meanwhile cultural heritage surveys, digital terrain modelling and further soil geochemical surveys have been completed with the objective of expanding the target areas for drilling in the current year.

Warrawoona (TLG 100%)

The Warrawoona project approximately 25km south from Marble Bar consists of 147km² exploration and prospecting licences over highly prospective geology and gold mineralisation indicated by historic production and geochemical sampling.

During the year the Company completed a programme of 882 soil geochemical samples over the Kiwi Ridge and Cutty Sark licence areas with the objective of delineating drill targets. This was followed up at Kiwi Ridge with a 16 hole drilling programme completed in June 2011 (results pending). Two scout RC holes were drilled at the Cutty Sark prospect. Results included 5m @ 3.3 g/t Au from 38m depth and 5m @ 2.0 g/t from 18m depth. Whilst encouraging these scout holes failed to replicate the 8m @ 8.5 g/t Au from 16m in depth in historic open hole drilling. The larger Warrawoona exploration license was granted in March 2011 allowing the start of fieldwork, including cultural heritage surveys towards permitting of drilling large shear-zone hosted gold targets. This licence surrounds excised tenements that contain the Klondyke gold deposit of Jupiter Mines Ltd, and exploration will focus where this gold deposit is interpreted to extend into Talga's ground.

DIRECTOR'S REPORT

Mosquito Creek Project (TLG 100%)

The Mosquito Creek project is located 50km east of Nullagine and 150km south from Talga's Warrawoona project, where over 105km² of project tenements cover zones of gold mineralisation hosted by the Mosquito Creek Formation. With the extensive exploration activity by the Company in other areas the Mosquito Creek project has had a lower profile during the year. A SGM method digital elevation model and orthoimagery survey was flown to assist in further exploration and the delineation of mineralised channel sequences. The project was also expanded with the acquisition of four new prospecting licences near Nullagine, proximal to where Millennium Minerals has announced JORC compliant resources of more than 1.24 million ounces of gold at its Nullagine project (see ASX 11/1/2011). The successful financing and start-up of a +1 million ounce gold deposit in the region is encouraging and Talga intends accelerating its efforts in the Mosquito Creek project.

Bullfinch Project (TLG 100%)

The Bullfinch Project is located 40km north of Southern Cross in a prolific gold producing district of the Yilgarn Craton. The Company is exploring the area for high metamorphic grade gold deposits similar in style to that of the Edna May (1.5m+ oz Au) gold deposit currently being mined approximately 70km to the west. The tenements are additionally prospective for Big Bell and Yilgarn Star-style gold deposits.

Fieldwork during the year included an auger drilling programme to complete the geochemical orientation process of defining effective methods for gold target development. Geochemical programmes will now commence along the target zones extending from current prospects for potential drilling. Permitting and land access work was also completed during the year.

Preliminary analyses of government gravity and magnetic surveys have outlined potential structural controls and source rocks for the high grade outcropping gold, bismuth and tellurium mineralisation at the Harold Holt prospect. In addition a quantity of mafic to ultramafic rock types outcropping east of Bullfinch in areas historically mapped as granitoid have been identified. The Company has pegged an additional 930km² of ground covering the majority of the prospective gravity and magnetic features.

RESULTS OF OPERATIONS

The operating loss after income tax of the Company for the year ended 30 June 2011 was \$1,500,963.

No dividend has been paid during or is recommended for the financial year ended 30 June 2011.

SIGNIFICANT CHANGES IN STATE OF AFFAIRS

The Company was admitted to the Official List of the ASX on 7 July 2010.

On 6 May 2011 the Company issued a placement of 1,854,702 shares at 35 cents to institutional investors

On 9 June 2011 the Company issued a placement of 4,147,205 shares at 35 cents to institutional investors

There were no other significant changes in the state of affairs of the Company during the financial year not otherwise dealt with in this report and the financial statements.

FUTURE DEVELOPMENTS

Other than as referred to in this report, further information as to likely developments in the operations of the Company and expected results of those operations would, in the opinion of the Directors, be speculative and prejudicial to the interests of the Company and its shareholders.

SUBSEQUENT EVENTS

On 21 July 2011, the Company issued 500,000 unlisted options under the Company's Employee Option Plan with an exercise price of 35 cents and an expiry of 21 July 2015.

FINANCIAL POSITION

The Company's working capital, being current assets less current liabilities was \$4,466,441 at 30 June 2011.

In the Directors' opinion there are reasonable grounds to believe that the Company will be able to pay its debts as and when they become due and payable.

The Company's exploration activities are subject to the Western Australian Mining Act. The Company has a policy of complying with or exceeding its environmental performance obligations. The Board believes that the Company has adequate systems in place for the management of its environmental requirements. The Company aims to ensure the appropriate standard of environmental care is achieved, and in doing so, that it is aware of and is in compliance with all environmental legislation. The Directors of the Company are not aware of any breach of environmental legislation for the financial year under review.

The Directors of the Company have reviewed the requirements under the Australian National Greenhouse Emission Regulation ("NGER"). NGER has no impact on the Company.

PROCEEDINGS ON BEHALF OF THE COMPANY

No person has applied for leave of Court to bring proceedings on behalf of the company or intervene in any proceedings to which the company is a party for the purpose of taking responsibility behalf of the company for all or any part of those proceedings.

The company was not a party to any such proceedings during the year.

SHARE OPTIONS

As at the date of this report, there were 1,600,000 ordinary shares under option. 1,100,000 options have an exercise price of 20 cents and expire 16 December 2012. 500,000 have an exercise price of 35 cents and expire 21 July 2015.

No person entitled to exercise any option referred to above have or had, by virtue of the option, a right to participate in any share issue of any other body corporate.

DIRECTOR'S REPORT

REMUNERATION REPORT (Audited)

This report details the type and amount of remuneration for each director of Talga Gold Ltd, and for the executives receiving the highest remuneration.

Remuneration Policy

It is the Company's objective to provide maximum stakeholder benefit from the retention of a high quality board by remunerating directors fairly and appropriately with reference to relevant employment market conditions. To assist in achieving the objective the Board links the nature and amount of executive directors' emoluments to the Company's financial and operational performance. The intended outcomes of this remuneration structure are:

- Retention and motivation of Directors
- Performance rewards to allow Directors to share the rewards of the success of Talga Gold Ltd

The remuneration of an executive director will be decided by the Board. In determining competitive remuneration rates the Board reviews local and international trends among comparative companies and the industry generally. It also examines terms and conditions for the employee share option plan.

The maximum remuneration of non-executive Directors is the subject of Shareholder resolution in accordance with the Company's Constitution, and the Corporations Act 2001 as applicable. The appointment of non-executive Director remuneration within that maximum will be made by the Board having regard to the inputs and value to the Company of the respective contributions by each non-executive Director.

The Board may award additional remuneration to non-executive Directors called upon to perform extra services or make special exertions on behalf of the Company.

There is no scheme to provide retirement benefits, other than statutory superannuation, to non-executive directors.

All equity based remuneration paid to directors and executives is valued at the cost to the Company and expensed. Options are valued using the Black-Scholes methodology.

Performance Based Remuneration

The issue of options to directors is in accordance with the Company's employee share option plan to encourage the alignment of personal and shareholder returns. The intention of this program is to align the objectives of directors/executives with that of the business and shareholders. In addition all directors and executives are encouraged to hold shares in the Company.

The Company has not paid bonuses to directors or executives to date.

Company Performance, Shareholder Wealth and Directors' and Executives' Remuneration

The remuneration policy has been tailored to maximise the commonality of goals between shareholders and directors and executives. The method applied in achieving this aim to date being the issue of options to directors to encourage the alignment of personal and shareholder interests. The Company believes this policy will be the most effective in increasing shareholder wealth.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

For the Year Ended 30 June 2011

1. STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

The financial report is a general purpose financial report that has been prepared in accordance with Australian Accounting Standards including Australian Accounting Interpretations, other authoritative pronouncements of the Australian Accounting Standards Board and the Corporations Act 2001.

The financial report covers the Company of Talga Gold Limited. Talga Gold Limited is a public Company, incorporated and domiciled in Australia.

The financial report of Talga Gold as an individual entity complies with all International Financial Reporting Standards (IFRS) in their entirety.

The financial report has been prepared on an accruals basis and is based on historical costs and does not take into account changing money values or, except where stated, current valuations of non-current assets. Cost is based on the fair values of the consideration given in exchange for assets.

The following is a summary of the material accounting policies adopted by the Company in the preparation of the financial report. The accounting policies have been consistently applied, unless otherwise stated.

(a) Business Combinations

Business combinations occur where an acquirer obtains control over one or more businesses and results in the consolidation of its assets and liabilities.

A business combination is accounted for by applying the acquisition method, unless it is a combination involving entities or businesses under common control. The acquisition method requires that for each business combination one of the combining entities must be identified as the acquirer (ie parent entity). The business combination will be accounted for as at the acquisition date, which is the date that control over the acquiree is obtained by the parent entity. At this date, the parent shall recognise, in the consolidated accounts, and subject to certain limited exceptions, the fair value of the identifiable assets acquired and liabilities assumed. In addition, contingent liabilities of the acquiree will be recognised where a present obligation has been incurred and its fair value can be reliably measured.

The acquisition may result in the recognition of goodwill or a gain from a bargain purchase. The method adopted for the measurement of goodwill will impact on the measurement of any non-controlling interest to be recognised in the acquiree where less than 100% ownership interest is held in the acquiree.

The acquisition date fair value of the consideration transferred for a business combination plus the acquisition date fair value of any previously held equity interest shall form the cost of the investment in the separate financial statements. Consideration may comprise the sum of the assets transferred by the acquirer, liabilities incurred by the acquirer to the former owners of the acquiree and the equity interests issued by the acquirer.

Fair value uplifts in the value of pre-existing equity holdings are taken to the statement of comprehensive income. Where changes in the value of such equity holdings had previously been recognised in other comprehensive income, such amounts are recycled to profit or loss.

Included in the measurement of consideration transferred is any asset or liability resulting from a contingent consideration arrangement. Any obligation incurred relating to contingent consideration is classified as either a financial liability or equity instrument, depending upon the nature of the arrangement. Rights to refunds of consideration previously paid are recognised as a receivable. Subsequent to initial recognition, contingent consideration classified as equity is not remeasured and its subsequent settlement is accounted for within equity. Contingent consideration classified as an asset or a liability is remeasured each reporting period to fair value through the statement of comprehensive income unless the change in value can be identified as existing at acquisition date.

All transaction costs incurred in relation to the business combination are expensed to the statement of comprehensive income.

1. STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (Cont.)

(b) Exploration, Evaluation and Development Expenditure

Exploration and evaluation costs are written off in the year they are incurred. Costs of acquisition are capitalised to areas of interest and carried forward where right of tenure of the area of interest is current and they are expected to be recouped through sale or successful development and exploitation of the area of interest or, where exploration and evaluation activities in the area of interest have not yet reached a stage that permits reasonable assessment of the existence of economically recoverable reserves.

When an area of interest is abandoned or the directors decide that it is not commercial, any accumulated acquisition costs in respect of that area are written off in the financial period the decision is made. Each area of interest is also reviewed at the end of each accounting period and accumulated acquisition costs written off to the extent that they will not be recoverable in the future. Where projects have advanced to the stage that directors have made a decision to mine, they are classified as development properties. When further development expenditure is incurred in respect of a development property, such expenditure is carried forward as part of the cost of that development property only when substantial future economic benefits are established. Otherwise such expenditure is classified as part of the cost of production or written off where production has not commenced

(c) Financial Instruments

Financial instruments in the scope of AASB 139 Financial Instruments: Recognition and Measurement are classified as either financial assets at fair value through profit or loss, loans and receivables, held-to-maturity investments, or available-for-sale investments, as appropriate. When financial instruments are recognised initially, they are measured at fair value, plus, in the case of investments not at fair value through profit or loss, directly attributable transactions costs. The Company determines the classification of its financial instruments after initial recognition and, when allowed and appropriate, re-evaluates this designation at each financial year-end.

All regular way purchases and sales of financial assets are recognised on the trade date i.e. the date that the Company commits to purchase the asset. Regular way purchases or sales are purchases or sales of financial assets under contracts that require delivery of the assets within the period established generally by regulation or convention in the marketplace.

(i) Financial assets at fair value through profit or loss

Financial assets classified as held for trading are included in the category 'financial assets at fair value through profit or loss'. Financial assets are classified as held for trading if they are acquired for the purpose of selling in the near term. Derivatives are also classified as held for trading unless they are designated as effective hedging instruments. Gains or losses on investments held for trading are recognised in profit or loss.

(ii) Held-to-maturity investments

Non-derivative financial assets with fixed or determinable payments and fixed maturity are classified as held-to-maturity when the Company has the positive intention and ability to hold to maturity. Investments intended to be held for an undefined period are not included in this classification. Investments that are intended to be held-to-maturity, such as bonds, are subsequently measured at amortised cost. This cost is computed as the amount initially recognised minus principal repayments, plus or minus the cumulative amortisation using the effective interest method of any difference between the initially recognised amount and the maturity amount. This calculation includes all fees and points paid or received between parties to the contract that are an integral part of the effective interest rate, transaction costs and all other premiums and discounts. For investments carried at amortised cost, gains and losses are recognised in profit or loss when the investments are derecognised or impaired, as well as through the amortisation process.

(iii) Loans and receivables

Loans and receivables are non-derivative financial assets with fixed or determinable payments that are not quoted in an active market. Such assets are carried at amortised cost using the effective interest method. Gains and losses are recognised in profit or loss when the loans and receivables are derecognised or impaired, as well as through the amortisation process.

1. STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (Cont.)

(iv) Available-for-sale investments

Available-for-sale investments are those non-derivative financial assets that are designated as available-for-sale or are not classified as any of the three preceding categories. After initial recognition available-for sale investments are measured at fair value with gains or losses being recognised as a separate component of equity until the investment is derecognised or until the investment is determined to be impaired, at which time the cumulative gain or loss previously reported in equity is recognised in profit or loss.

The fair value of investments that are actively traded in organised financial markets is determined by reference to quoted market bid prices at the close of business on the balance sheet date. For investments with no active market, fair value is determined using valuation techniques. Such techniques include using recent arm's length market transactions; reference to the current market value of another instrument that is substantially the same; discounted cash flow analysis and option pricing models.

(v) Financial Liabilities

Non-derivative financial liabilities (excluding financial guarantees) are subsequently measured at amortised cost using the effective interest rate method.

Impairment

At each reporting date, the Company assesses whether there is objective evidence that a financial instrument has been impaired. In the case of available-for-sale financial instruments, a prolonged decline in the value of the instrument is considered to determine whether an impairment has arisen. Impairment losses are recognised in the income statement.

Derecognition

Financial assets are derecognised where the contractual rights to receipt of cash flows expires or the asset is transferred to another party whereby the entity no longer has any significant continuing involvement in the risks and benefits associated with the asset. Financial liabilities are derecognised where the related obligations are either discharged, cancelled or expired. The difference between the carrying value of the financial liability extinguished or transferred to another party and the fair value of consideration paid, including the transfer of non-cash assets or liabilities assumed, is recognised in profit or loss.

(d) Cash and Cash Equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents includes cash on hand, deposits held at call with banks, other short-term highly liquid investments with original maturities of three months or less, and bank overdrafts. Bank overdrafts are shown within financial liabilities in current liabilities on the Statement of Financial Position.

(e) Trade and Other Receivables

Trade receivables, which generally have 30-90 day terms, are recognised and carried at original invoice amount less an allowance for any uncollectible amounts. An allowance for doubtful debts is made when there is objective evidence that the entity will not be able to collect the debts. Bad debts are written off when identified.

(f) Revenue

Revenue from the sale of goods is recognised upon the delivery of goods to customers.

Interest revenue is recognised on a proportional basis taking into account the interest rates applicable to the financial assets.

Revenue from the rendering of a service is recognised upon the delivery of the service to the customers.

All revenue is stated net of the amount of goods and services tax (GST).

1. STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (Cont.)

(g) Impairment of Assets

At each reporting date, the Company reviews the carrying amounts of its tangible and intangible assets to determine whether there is any indication that those assets have suffered an impairment loss. If any such indication exists, the recoverable amount of the asset is estimated in order to determine the extent of the impairment loss (if any). Where the asset does not generate cash flows that are independent from the other assets, the Company estimates the recoverable amount of the cash-generating unit to which the asset belongs.

Recoverable amount is the higher of fair value less costs to sell and value in use. In assessing value in use, the estimated future cash flows are discounted to their present value using a pre-tax discount rate that reflects current market assessments of the time value of money and the risks specific to the asset for which the estimates of future cash flows have not been adjusted.

If the recoverable amount of an asset (or cash-generated unit) is estimated to be less than its carrying amount, the carrying amount of the asset (cash-generating unit) is reduced to its recoverable amount. An impairment loss is recognised in the income statement immediately, unless the relevant asset is carried at fair value, in which case the impairment loss is treated as a revaluation decrease. Where an impairment loss subsequently reverses, the carrying amount of the asset (cash-generating unit) is increased to the revised estimate of its recoverable amount, but only to the extent that the increased carrying amount does not exceed the carrying amount that would have been determined had no impairment loss been recognised for the asset (cash-generating unit) in prior years.

A reversal of an impairment loss is recognised in the income statement immediately, unless the relevant asset is carried at fair value, in which case the impairment loss is treated as a revaluation increase.

(h) Goods and Services Tax (GST)

Revenues, expenses and assets are recognised net of the amount of GST, except where the amount of GST incurred is not recoverable from the Australian Tax Office ("ATO"). In these circumstances the GST is recognised as part of the cost of acquisition of the asset or as part of an item of the expense. Receivables and payables in the statement of financial position are shown inclusive of GST.

The net amount of GST recoverable from, or payable to, the ATO is included as a current asset or liability in the statement of financial position.

Cash flows are included in the cash flow statement on a gross basis. The GST components of cash flows arising from investing and financing activities which are recoverable from, or payable to, the ATO are classified as operating cash flows.

1. STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (Cont.)

(i) Taxation

The Company adopts the liability method of tax-effect accounting whereby the income tax expense is based on the profit/loss from ordinary activities adjusted for any non-assessable or disallowed items.

Deferred tax is accounted for using the balance sheet liability method in respect of temporary differences arising between the tax bases of assets and liabilities and their carrying amounts in the financial statements. No deferred income tax will be recognised from the initial recognition of an asset or liability, excluding a business combination, where there is no effect on accounting or taxable profit or loss.

Deferred tax is calculated at the tax rates that are expected to apply to the period when the asset is realised or liability is settled. Deferred tax is credited in the income statement except where it relates to items that may be credited directly to equity, in which case the deferred tax is adjusted directly against equity.

Deferred income tax assets are recognised to the extent that it is probable that future tax profits will be available against which deductible temporary differences can be utilised.

The amount of benefits brought to account or which may be realised in the future is based on the assumption that no adverse change will occur in income taxation legislation and the anticipation that the Company will derive sufficient future assessable income to enable the benefit to be realised and comply with the conditions of deductibility imposed by the law.

(j) Trade and Other Payables

Trade payables and other payables are carried at amortised costs and represent liabilities for goods and services provided to the Company prior to the end of the financial year that are unpaid and arise when the Company becomes obliged to make future payments in respect of the purchase of these goods and services.

(k) Share Based Payments

Fair value is measured by use of a binomial model. The expected life used in the model has been adjusted, based on management's best estimate, for the effects of non-transferability, exercise restrictions, and behavioural considerations.

The fair value determined at the grant date of the equity-settled share-based payments is expensed on a straight-line basis over the vesting period, based on the Company's estimate of shares that will eventually vest.

For cash-settled share-based payments, a liability equal to the portion of the goods or services received is recognised at the current fair value determined at each reporting date.

(l) Issued Capital

Issued and paid up capital is recognised at the fair value of the consideration received by the Company. Any transaction costs arising on the issue of ordinary shares are recognised directly in equity as a reduction of the share proceeds received.

1. STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (Cont.)

(m) Earnings Per Share

Basic earnings per share is calculated as net earnings attributable to members, adjusted to exclude costs of servicing equity (other than dividends) and preference share dividends, divided by the weighted average number of ordinary shares, adjusted for a bonus element.

Diluted EPS is calculated as net earnings attributable to members, adjusted for costs of servicing equity (other than dividends) and preference share dividends; the after tax effect of dividends and interest associated with dilutive potential ordinary shares that would have been recognised as expenses; and other non-discretionary changes in revenues or expenses during the period that would result from the dilution of potential ordinary shares; divided by the weighted average number of ordinary shares and dilutive potential ordinary shares, adjusted for any bonus element.

(n) Critical Accounting Estimates and Judgments

The directors evaluate estimates and judgments incorporated into the financial report based on historical knowledge and best available current information. Estimates assume a reasonable expectation of future events and are based on current trends and economic data, obtained both externally and within the Company.

Key Estimates - Impairment

The Company assesses impairment at the end of each reporting period by evaluating conditions and events specific to the Company that may be indicative of impairment triggers. Recoverable amounts of relevant assets are reassessed using value-in-use calculations which incorporate various key assumptions.

Key Judgement – Exploration and evaluation costs

Exploration and evaluation expenditure incurred is accumulated in respect of each identifiable area of interest. These costs are carried forward in respect of an area that has not at balance sheet date reached a stage which permits a reasonable assessment of the existence or otherwise of economically recoverable reserves, and active and significant operations in, or relating to, the area of interest are continuing.

Key Judgment – Environmental Issues

Balances disclosed in the financial statements and notes thereto are not adjusted for any pending or enacted environmental legislation, and the directors understanding thereof. At the current stage of the Company's development and its current environmental impact the directors believe such treatment is reasonable and appropriate.

(o) Adoption of New and Revised Accounting Standards

During the current period the Company adopted all of the new and revised Australian Accounting Standards and Interpretations applicable to its operations which became mandatory.

The adoptions of these standards has impacted the recognition, measurement and disclosure of certain transactions. The following is an explanation of the impact the adoption of these standards and interpretations has had on the financial statements of Talga Gold Limited.

New Accounting Standards and Interpretations

The following new standards and amendments to standards are mandatory for the financial year beginning 1 July 2010.

AASB 2009-5 Further Amendments to Australian Accounting Standards arising from the Annual Improvements Project (AASB 5, 8, 101, 107, 117, 118, 136, and 139)

AASB 2010-3 Amendments to Australian Accounting Standards arising from the Annual Improvements Project (AASB 3, 7, 121, 128, 131, 132 and 139)

AASB Interpretation 19 Extinguishing Financial Liabilities with Equity Instruments and AASB 2009-13 Amendments to Australian Accounting Standards arising from Interpretation 19.

The adoption of these standards did not have any impact in the current period or any prior period and is unlikely to affect future periods.

New Accounting Standards and Interpretations that are not yet mandatory

Certain new accounting standards and interpretations have been published that are not mandatory for 30 June 2011 reporting periods. The Group's (Company if applicable) assessment of the impact of these new standards and interpretations is set out below.

(i) AASB 9 Financial Instruments, AASB 2009-11 Amendments to Australian Accounting Standards arising from AASB 9 and AASB 2010-7 Amendments to Australian Accounting Standards arising from AASB 9 (December 2010) (effective from 1 January 2013)

AASB 9 Financial Instruments addresses the classification, measurement and derecognition of financial assets and financial liabilities. The standard is not applicable until 1 January 2013 but is available for early adoption. When adopted, the standard is not expected to impact on the Group's (Company if applicable) accounting for financial assets as it does not have any available for sale assets other than equity investments. There will be no impact on the group's accounting for financial liabilities, as the new requirements only affect the accounting for financial liabilities that are designated at fair value through profit or loss and the group does not have any such liabilities. The Company has decided not to early adopt AASB 9.

(ii) Revised AASB 124 Related Party Disclosures and AASB 2009-12 Amendments to Australian Accounting Standards (effective from 1 January 2011)

Talga Gold Limited is listed on the ASX and is not eligible to adopt the new Australian Accounting Standards – Reduced Disclosure Requirements. The two standards will therefore have no impact on the financial statements of the entity.

The Board will seek to develop a more extensive Risk Management Policy over the coming year, which can then be used as a guide to be used throughout the Company in identifying and communicating business risks.

The Board has received assurance from the Financial Controller and Chairman that the declarations made in accordance with section 295A of the Corporation Act 2001 are:

1. founded on a sound system of risk management and internal compliance and control which implements the policies adopted by the board
2. the Company's risk management and internal compliance and control system is operating efficiently and effectively in all material respects.

Principle 8: Remunerate fairly and responsibly

Remuneration Arrangements

As the entire board consist of three (3) members, the Company does not have a Remuneration and Nomination Committee. The Directors believe given the size and scope of the operations of the Company, it is sufficient for the full board to assume those responsibilities that are ordinarily assigned to a remuneration and nomination committee.

Where appropriate, independent consultants are engaged to appropriate levels of remuneration.

It is the Company's objective to provide maximum stakeholder benefit from the retention of a high quality board by remunerating directors fairly and appropriately with reference to relevant employment market conditions. To assist in achieving the objective the Board links the nature and amount of executive directors' emoluments to the Company's financial and operational performance. The expected outcomes of this remuneration structure are:

- Retention and motivation of Directors
- Performance rewards to allow Directors to share the rewards of the success of Talga Gold Limited

The remuneration of an executive director will be decided by the rest of the Board. In determining competitive remuneration rates the Committee reviews local and international trends among comparative companies and the industry generally. It also examines terms and conditions for the employee share option plan.

The Company is committed to remunerating its senior executives in a manner that is market-competitive and consistent with best practice as well as supporting the interests of shareholders. Consequently, under the Senior Executive Remuneration Policy the remuneration of senior executives may be comprised of the following:

- fixed salary that is determined from a review of the market and reflects core performance requirements and expectations;
- a performance bonus designed to reward actual achievement by the individual of performance objectives and for materially improved Company performance;
- participation in any share/option scheme with thresholds approved by shareholders;
- statutory superannuation.

By remunerating senior executives through performance and long-term incentive plans in addition to their fixed remuneration the Company aims to align the interests of senior executives with those of shareholders and increase Company performance. During the year there were no Non-Director Executives.

The value of shares and options were they to be granted to senior executives would be calculated using the Black and Scholes method.

The objective behind using this remuneration structure is to drive improved Company performance and thereby increase shareholder value as well as aligning the interests of executives and shareholders.

The Board may use its discretion with respect to the payment of bonuses, stock options and other incentive payments.

The maximum remuneration of non-executive Directors is the subject of shareholder resolution in accordance with the Company's Constitution, and the Corporations Act 2001 as applicable. The appointment of non-executive Director remuneration within that maximum will be made by the Board having regard to the inputs and value of the Company of the respective contributions by each non-executive Director. Usually Non-Executive Directors do not receive performance based bonuses but may participate in equity schemes of the Company.

The Board may award additional remuneration to non-executive Directors called upon to perform extra services or make special exertions on behalf of the Company.

There is no scheme to provide retirement benefits, other than statutory superannuation, to non-executive directors.

All remuneration paid to directors and executives is valued at the cost to the Company and expensed.

Full details regarding the remuneration of Directors, is included in the Directors' Report.
