Talga Resources Ltd (ASX:TLG) ("Talga" or "the Company") is pleased to report further high grade graphite results from drilling completed at the Company's 100%-owned projects located in north Sweden (Fig 1).

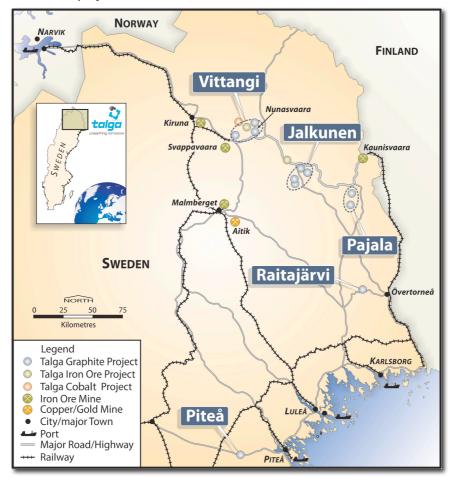
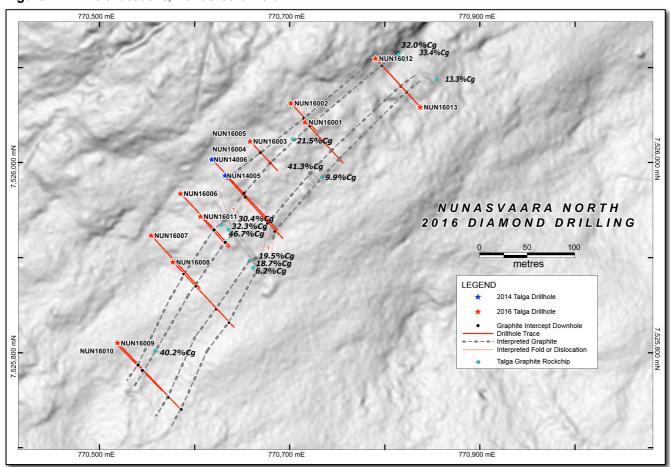


Figure 2 Drill hole locations, Nunasvaara North.

The results are from the remaining two drillholes at the *Vittangi* graphite project and record high grade graphite ("Cg") from the southern-most line of drilling at the Nunasvaara North deposit (Fig 2) which remains open in this direction and at depth. Significant graphite intercepts from these two holes are highlighted below and detailed in Table 1-2 along with all previously announced significant graphite results from the 2016 drilling program (see ASX:TLG 6 Dec 2016).

Significant results include:

- 23.1m @ 22.9% Cg from 27.4m in NUN16008 (hangingwall unit) and 27.1m @ 16.4% Cg from 94.0m (footwall unit)
- 10.2m @ 21.7% Cg from 45.9m in NUN16009 (hangingwall unit) and 15.9m @ 13.6%Cg from 109.1m (footwall unit)

The new drill results from Nunasvaara North will be used to revise the current JORC (2012) resource estimate at Vittangi. *Preliminary work on the new resource estimate is underway and on track to be delivered and announced next month.*

At the Company's **Piteå** graphite project located approximately 40km west of the port of Piteå and 300km south from Vittangi, Talga tested two electromagnetic anomalies for graphite mineralisation (see Figure 1 and Table 1 for location data).

The drillholes intersected multiple broad zones of visibly large-flake graphite in gneissic and granitoid host rocks. High resolution scanning and digital processing of outcrop samples by CSIRO demonstrate the majority of the graphite particles are 200-300 μ m length and that 20% of the graphite particles exceed >600 μ m length, however the mineralised zones average less than significant grades (<5%Cg).

These results will be reviewed along with the associated geophysical data to determine any future work at Piteå in the context of Talga's higher grade projects further north.

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Figure 1 Talga's 100% owned projects, Sweden.

The hangingwall is comprised of mafic volcanoclastics and tuffacous units and the footwall to the mineralisation is a mafic intrusive (dolerite-gabbro). The graphite units are regionally extensive over many kilometres and are interpreted to have developed in a shallow fresh water basin in the early Proterozoic (Circa 1.8 billion years). Subsequent deformation, possibly related to domal intrusive bodies have metamorphosed and tilted the units to the subvertical orientations present today. The graphite at Nunasvaara is very fine grained, very high grade and metallurgical testwork completed by the Company shows graphite and graphene products can be produced to commercial specifications. The mineralisation at Nybrännan is very similar to that at Nunasvaara; a 15-20m wide lithologically continuous unit of very fine grained, dark-grey to black flake graphite containing 10-20% graphitic carbon. The hangingwall is comprised of mafic volcanoclastics and tuffacous units and the footwall to the mineralisation is a mafic intrusive (dolerite-gabbro). The copper mineralisation at Lautakoski is hosted in intensely altered (K-feldspar, scapolite, silica, albite) mafic volcanoclastic and tuffaceous sediments. Cobalt, gold and molybdenum mineralization is broadly coincident with the copper mineralization. The graphite mineralisation at both Gråliden and Önusträsket is classified as coarse flake graphite. At both prospects the mineralization is hosted within a biotite-graphite-quartz-muscovite gneiss. The gneissic units contain common pegmatite and aplite dykes.

Petrographical, geophysical and geological interpretation of all prospects is ongoing. An updated mineral resource estimate for Nunasvaara including the new results from Nunasvaara North is expected to be completed during the first quarter 2017.
